WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS – Parking is not allowed on city streets or within ten feet of roadway pavement in any municipal right-of-way between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 8:00 a.m. unless such vehicle is in a driveway approach or otherwise parked behind the curb where curb exists. This law allows for snow removal and is in effect between November 1st and April 1st, even when there is no snow. No warnings will be issued; consider this your warning notice.

DOG LICENSES – Any dog(s) six (6) months or older is required to be licensed with Hyrum City. Dogs are required to be licensed even if they stay inside your home or never leave your yard. The license fees are as follows:

Neutered/Spayed dogs - \$8.00

Male dogs - \$12.00


Female dogs - \$15.00

A veterinarian certificate is required to verify rabies vaccination and the dog being neutered or spayed.

All dogs must be licensed by Wednesday, February 29th. After February 29th a \$10 late fee will be assessed in addition to the regular license fee. Owners will be issued a citation for failure to have his/her dog properly licensed.

Also, please remember that City ordinance permits a **MAXIMUM** of **two dogs per household**.



STORMWATER – Keeping ice and snow off your driveway and side walks is important for safety. The following tips can help you choose the best deicing product for your home and the environment. Make sure to buy your deicing product well before the big storm hits, otherwise you will be looking at empty shelves, and have few, if any, environmental choices to make at the store. Check the package closely to see what you are buying. Shovel early and often. When it comes to snow removal, there is no substitute for muscle and elbow grease. Deicers work best when there is only a thin layer of snow or ice that must be melted. So get out the snow shovel and move as much snow as you can during the storm if possible.
